Youth Mental Health First Aid (MHFA)

Youth Mental Health First Aid USA is a public education program which introduces participants to the unique risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems in adolescents, builds understanding of the importance of early intervention, and teaches individuals how to help an adolescent in crisis or experiencing a mental health challenge. MHFA uses a number of activities to demonstrate how to assess a mental health crisis, provide initial help and connect young people to professional, peer, social, and self-help care. Participants DO NOT learn to diagnose, nor how to provide any therapy or counseling—rather, participants learn to support a youth developing signs and symptoms of a mental illness or in an emotional crisis by applying a core five-step action plan. *Faculty*: Patsy Carter, Ph.D., MO Department of Mental Health; Jermine D. 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Juvenile Law Update

This workshop will include the traditional Case Law Update, including Supreme Court Cases, recent decisions (Graham Miller), state and federal legislation. Special topics will include PREA (Prison Rape Elimination Act), Orders of Protection, and Technical Evidence Collection and Presentation.

Growing Up in a World of Technology & Designer Drugs

This track of instruction will cover two important teen issues: technology and drugs. Technology is a major part of an adolescent's life, and this section will offer information about teen use of technology, with the following topics to be covered: social media, cyber-bullying and school culture, sexting, online predators, gaming, effective technology, safety messaging and emerging trends.

The other section will involve discussion and training on drug use and its impact on our youth. Topics covered will be the dangers and marketing of "gateway drugs" and trends toward "designer drugs"; drug recognition and related resources will be included.

From Hurting to Healing: What Juvenile Justice-Involved Girls Need to Heal Trauma, Build Resilience, Cultural Capital, and Thrive

For a decade, Juvenile Justice institutions nationwide have grappled with the dramatic increase of girls and young women entering its system, where girls of color are disproportionally represented. For adolescent girls, experiencing trauma is the single common pathway into the juvenile justice system, exposing them to a plethora of increased risk for substance abuse, mental illness, sexually transmitted infections, early and unplanned pregnancy, relationship violence, and suicide. The dynamic, interactive From Hurting to Healing curriculum engages its participants in a process of building a strong knowledge- and skill-base to identify and respond to the needs of juvenile justice-involved girls at the individual, community and systems levels. From Hurting to Healing builds on contemporary literature, promising programs and practice-based evidence in gender-responsive, trauma-informed and culturally relevant approaches to offer practical tools participants can immediately use in their work with girls. Participants will be guided from basic knowledge and skill building in trauma, health risks impacting girls, and ways to engage girls in healing and resiliency through the lenses of gender and culture, to creating a plan for integrating their newly learned skills once they return to the field.

Examining National Trends in Juvenile Justice Reform: Exploring Multi-Strategy in Removing Youth from the Adult Criminal Justice System

This track will be interactive and thought provoking. Highlights include a family led panel discussion concerning the challenges and recommendations from families who have children in the system. The workshop will include an indepth training about implementing federal laws and regulations, such as the Prison Rape Elimination Act. This will be followed by a discussion with state policy experts from around the country about the emerging state trends such as certification, raising the age, and pretrial detention. Come ready to share ideas, learn new things and put your plans into action.

Go about 2 miles on Business 54 to 1st stoplight. Turn right at the stoplight onto State Rd. HH (Horseshoe Bend Parkway). I.5 miles down HH, turn right on Carol Road. Country Club Hotel is half-mile down Carol Road on the left.

From Columbia

Hwy 63 South to Jefferson City. Hwy 54 West to Lake Ozark. Exit on Business 54, crossing Bagnell Dam. Go about 2 miles on Business 54 to 1st stoplight. Turn right at the stoplight onto State Rd. HH (Horseshoe Bend Parkway). I.5 miles down HH, turn right on Carol Road. Country Club Hotel is half-mile down Carol Road on the left.

From Kansas City

I-70 East to Hwy 65 South to Sedalia. Hwy 50 East to Tipton. Turn right at stoplight and take South Hwy 5 to East Hwy 52 and follow to Eldon.
