Tackling the School-to-Prison Pipeline

As school districts have known for years, and even the Federal Government is now acknowledging, "Zero Tolerance" policies do not work as a means of dealing with inappropriate behaviors and that these policies may contribute to racial disparities in school discipline. Participants will learn advocacy tools that can be used by juvenile defenders, court officers, and child welfare personnel to push back against the school-to-prison pipeline. Participants will be exposed to interventions and diversion strategies that have been implemented locally as well as nation-wide that have helped to reduce racial disparities. Specifically hear how Clayton County, Georgia's Juvenile Court has implemented diversion alternatives to keep kids out of Court along with how the Columbia Public School district, Columbia, MO is utilizing a variety of alternative solutions to school behaviors, including an off-site Alternative Center for Education and the use of Restorative Practices which seeks to be proactive in building relationships with students and minimizing the need for disciplinary actions. Further, the Minority Achievement Committee (MAC) Scholars will present *The Table of Opportunity Addressing the Achievement Gap*, based on the Social Justice concept of Table of Opportunity and the impact it has had on their referrals to the Court.

Who Are These Kids and How Can We Help Them?

This seminar incorporates three workshops into one fantastic seminar geared towards those juvenile justice professionals who work with youth in secure confinement but could also be very applicable to professionals who work with youth in residential settings. The following are the three workshop descriptions:

Kids Are Different

Because Kids Are Different, the juvenile justice system responds differently and is designed with a different purpose than the adult corrections system. The juvenile justice system does this because it's the law, but also because the importance of doing so is supported by years of research. This workshop session will provide participants with a working knowledge of key aspects of adolescent development – cognitive, moral, identity, social, biological, and competence (mastery of skills) development and provide opportunities to apply this knowledge to critical decision-making with youth in custody.

Positive Youth Justice: Programming through Positive Youth Development

Youth in secure confinement provide a captive audience, regardless of how long or short a time we may have with them. Positive Youth Development provides a framework through which to program in ways that help youth capitalize on their strengths, develop pro-social competencies, and connect to opportunities to help them avoid problematic behavior in the future. In this session, participants will look at the three basic assumptions of Positive Youth Development (PYD) and practice applying them to programming, and understand the importance of goal development in planning program activities.

& Effective Interpersonal Communication

Knowledge of the key aspects of Adolescent Development and an understanding of the principles of Positive Youth Development are meaningless if staff members are not able to effectively communicate with co-workers and the juveniles in their care. Communication is the foundation for all we do in the field of juvenile justice. In this workshop session, participants will learn the components of the communication process, examine the causes of miscommunications, practice using the skills of paraphrasing, mirroring and questioning, and demonstrate the use of effective feedback.

Forensic Investigation of Child Abuse and Neglect

Back by popular demand, this seminar will cover the fundamental aspects of forensic medical evaluations of suspected child abuse. Many investigations of child abuse depend heavily on the presence of medical forensic evidence, and, in child physical abuse, injury plausibility. Three forensic pediatricians (child abuse pediatricians) will discuss medical findings and their implications for investigative and legal personnel. Topics to be covered include: head injury, fractures, abdominal injuries, skin injuries, acute rape, child sexual abuse, medical and investigative collaboration, prevention, and child outcomes after abuse. Attendees will be better equipped to investigate and handle cases involving medical forensic findings, leading to better outcomes for children and families.

Ethics in Juvenile Justice

The purpose of the ethics course is to enable the participant to differentiate between moral, ethical and legal frameworks. Class participants will be able to identify powers and authority of the Juvenile Officer, as well as Children's Division; define the scope of the relationship between the juvenile and those agencies responsible for providing services; explore ethical decision-making and the exercise of police powers; understand evidentiary standards and behavior in front of the tribunal; discuss cross over liability and develop risk management strategies.

The course will begin with an introduction to ethics and proceed with an overview of the structure of the law. More in depth discussions will continue into the roles of law enforcement, juvenile officers and children's division case managers/investigators, while providing examples, case law and legal implications. This will be followed by a discussion of evidentiary standards and behavior before the tribunal and selected issues facing the juvenile officer, as well as law enforcement and children's division personnel. The course will conclude with a thorough review of the Heartland case and liability issues faced by the juvenile officer and children's division personnel.

Girl Matters

The bulk of this seminar will focus on how to create a gender responsive culture by aligning gender responsive theories with the life experiences of girls utilizing the Girl Matters curriculum. The fundamentals of a gender responsive culture will be explored in the context of what matters to girls. The focus areas are based on findings in current research, gender responsive theory and practical experience with girls and young women. These building blocks are not meant to be all inclusive; instead, they are designed to introduce staff to the fundamentals of a gender responsive environment that is designed to value and improve outcomes for girls and women. Also covered in this seminar will be issues related to teen dating and sexual coercion. The later portion of the training will utilize the Girl Matters/ SAVVY Sisters curriculum. This workshop is the practical application of the Girl Matters Creating a Culture that Celebrates and Values Girls and Young Women. The SAVVY Sisters workshop will entail an overview of the fundamental building blocks that are essential to providing gender responsive programs and services. The SAVVY program model focuses on girls' protective factors within a gender-responsive program environment through a holistic approach. The Curriculum is intended to increase knowledge and skills to address girls' pathways into the juvenile justice system.
